

Arizona Voters Across the Political Spectrum **Support New Ways of Addressing Homelessness**

ARIZONA VOTERS:

Think that homelessness is getting worse, and that street homelessness threatens public safety.

Want the state to **ban street camping** and move
these homeless individuals
to better, supervised shelter
options.

Want homelessness resources to go towards **lower-cost shelter options** that serve more individuals and require participation in services.

Voters are more likely to support politicians who propose new solutions to street homelessness.



Arizona voters are nearly **20 times** more likely to say homelessness is getting worse (68%) than is getting better (4%)

Voters in Maricopa County and Pima County are even more pessimistic about how the state handles homelessness.



Eight in ten Arizona voters want the state legislature to **ban street camping**

Both support and strong support for banning street camping is higher for Hispanic and African American voters than it is for white voters.

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HOW DO WE SOLVE HOMELESSNESS?



In your opinion, which of the following statements is the best way to solve unsheltered homelessness in Arizona?

WHICH SOLUTION IS MORE IMPORTANT?



Given limited government funding, do you think it is more important for the state to ...

66% Provide **low-cost temporary** shelter options, along with access to services, to as many homeless individuals as possible

Provide **high-cost permanent** housing, along with access to services, to a limited number of 18% homeless individuals who are most in need



69% of Democrats, 77% of Independents and 88% of Republicans are more likely to support electing people to office who propose new ways of addressing homelessness and who make reducing street homelessness a priority.

> Support is strong across the states, but is highest in the 1st, 6th, 7th, and 8th Congressional Districts.
