### The Solution

Expand access to civic participation in regulatory processes by allowing courts in locations across the state to hear cases that involve challenges to bureaucratic regulations.

### Why it Matters

Requiring the bureaucratic agencies to defend their actions in courts where those impacted live and work will increase accountability and help level the playing field for challengers.
