HOMELESSNESS IN NORTH CAROLINA: A Rapidly Developing Crisis

Since 2013, North Carolina has doubled-down on a failed homelessness alleviation strategy known as Housing First—programs that prioritize longterm, taxpayer-subsidized housing over programs that help people achieve sobriety, mental wellness, and independence. At the same time, the state has eliminated two-thirds of its transitional housing capacity.

The results have been a disaster.

In the last five years alone, the number of **unsheltered homeless** North Carolinians climbed by 3,400—**a 41% increase**.





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Over the last decade, North Carolina has removed **TWO-THIRDS** of its **rehabilitation-oriented transitional housing supply for homeless individuals**.

And the share of homeless individuals with substance abuse issues who are living on the street without assistance has **DOUBLED**.



THE SOLUTION

Audit **public spending and outcomes** on homelessness services. Create greater public transparency for homelessness data. Increase access to involuntary treatment for those struggling with severe mental illness.

Clear and **prohibit** street encampments; hold municipalities accountable for failing to enforce the law.

Designate **shelters and campsites** that offer security, sanitation, and services. Create **drug-free homeless service zones** to ensure that everyone has a fair chance of staying sober.

WHY IT MATTERS

Due to the failed policies of Housing First, **North Carolina's homeless numbers are increasing rapidly**, and those who need services most are facing an artificial scarcity of resources.



THE BOTTOM LINE:

Housed and unhoused North Carolinians alike need outcomes-based solutions to the homelessness crisis that improve public safety and encourage human flourishing.
